The Rev Says:



A few weeks back, the Plymouth area clergy started talking about Thanksgiving --how over the years the interfaith service had dwindled in attendance (to where it was basically just representative clergy and a small crowd of committed “die hards”); how current arrangements separated out the Pilgrim’s Progress people and the Wampanoag from the worship, so that it was no longer the celebration of cooperation and unity we hoped it would be.

We began to wonder how we might do things differently. What if we gathered for worship not on Thanksgiving day but earlier in the week, say the Sunday evening before the holiday? What if we chose a time that worked for both children and older people? What if we found a way to include the perspective of the Wompanoag? What if our service were enhanced by a joint children’s choir, and perhaps teenagers playing musical offerings?

The good news about all this brainstorming was that we all agreed it was time for a change. Plans will be firmed up, but at this point it looks like we will hold a interfaith worship service on either Sunday, November 24th or Monday, November 25th. It will be after the parade, and hopefully a time when people will feel more able to come to a special worship service, given that family obligations – the cooking and entertaining part of Thanksgiving -- will not yet be fully upon us.

Remember, God loves a cheerful giver and wants us to experience the joy that comes from both our gratitude for our gifts, and our generosity in our giving. So let’s all try to be present on October 20th to celebrate our commitment to good stewardship on Chest of Joash Sunday. I’m looking forward to walking up to the chest with you.

Missions News

Missions is happy to report that on Rally Day the Sunday School was able to make 29 school kits for Church World Service. CWS works with partners, including the UCC, to eradicate hunger and poverty and to promote peace and justice around the world. School Kits give children in impoverished schools, refugee camps, or other difficult settings some of the basic tools for learning. Thanks to everyone who contributed supplies and to the Sunday School for assembling them.

A thank you for our donation of \$700 was received from the South Shore Community Action Council on behalf of the Greater Plymouth Food Warehouse. SSCAC includes the food resources program, an early education program, fuel assistance, transportation for the elderly and disabled and a training program to prepare unemployed participants for jobs. 94% of all funds received is spent on these programs for people in need.

Augusta Moore sent a note of thanks to the Missions Committee for its donation to Saint Rock Haiti Foundation. She was able to purchase much needed medical supplies for the clinic and also pay for emergency ultrasounds for two pregnant women. The generous donations she received during her church presentation were mailed directly to the foundation.

October is our month for the Neighbors in Need offering. Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the UCC that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry(CAIM). Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries(JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants.

Thank you to everyone who makes a contribution of nonperishable food items to benefit the Greater Plymouth Food Warehouse. Collection bins are located on the steps going up to the sanctuary. Most needed items are canned fruit, cereal, juice, pb&j, baked beans, spaghetti sauce, condiments, mac & cheese, soup, canned tuna & chicken, canned vegetables, diapers and toilet paper.
