From Our Pastor

I was talking with Jenny, our Director of Christian Ed, about kids and faith, and she spoke of a "window of opportunity", a time when kids are more open to learning about faith and exploring their faith. And it got me thinking about this season we are about to begin – Advent and Christmas.

Advent, for those of you who don't know, is a season of preparation for the coming of Jesus into our world. Generally the texts (and hymns) speak of getting ready, of being watchful, or of God's faithfulness to us, God's desire to see the world made right. Each Sunday we light candles to mark our Advent waiting until the Christ child comes.

It strikes me that Advent is a window of opportunity for those who currently do not have a faith community, a time for people to come and see. Come and see what our church is about. Come and see how we express our hope and our joy. So what I want to ask you to think about is who might you invite to our church this month.

Elsewhere in this Herald there is a list of activities. There are *lots* of options for bringing a friend or friends to church.

If you know a young family – in your neighborhood, or family friends – that might like a celebration with meaning, ask them to join you at the Tree Lighting Open House on December 5th. Free food, music, and a nativity display – what's not to like? You could also inquire about Christmas Eve plans. Our 7pm service is short and sweet, and the pageant this year will be done in a way that includes "newcomer children" as well as our Sunday school kids. And the 11pm service is just beautiful.

If you know someone who has had a hard time this year, someone for whom the holidays might be difficult, you could invite them to our Service of Comfort and Peace (December 10th, 7pm). Many churches schedule these services (sometimes called "Blue Christmas") on the longest night, but ours is a little earlier in the month. It is a new experience of Emmanuel (God with us) to worship in this way.

Studies show that the way churches grow is from the personal invitation of members. As the angel said, "Be Not Afraid." Be not afraid and invite a friend!

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY: On Sunday, November 16, we celebrated the successes of the last 12 months with Habitat for Humanity of Greater Plymouth. One major project was for Bethany Casoni who was the first HFHGP homeowner 15 years ago. Volunteers recently finished a room in the basement for Bethany's daughter, now an adult in her 20's, giving her independence and a safe environment in which to live. Bethany, who grew up in The Church of the Pilgrimage, spoke at the service and was gracious in her appreciation of how much Habitat has meant to her over many years. We also celebrated the completion of a life in the home for a severely handicapped 15-year old boy in Carver. We are also pleased to announce the donation of 3 lots of land in Plymouth, donated by the Town, two of which will be built for veterans as part of the new initiative as a Habitat Veterans Build affiliate. Guild News

The Guild met on November 14th for a fascinating presentation by Barbara Lincoln, a volunteer for NEADS, a program that trains canine assistants for people who are deaf or have a disability. Barbara brought along Boris, a five month old yellow Lab in training. Boris will spend the next 18 months in training by volunteer inmates as part of the Prison Pup Partnership. On weekends, Boris is taken out of prison, and his training will be reinforced by a volunteer family who will socialize and train him from Friday to Sunday. Truly a bonding experience for all involved. Assistance dogs, such as Boris, bring lifechanging independence, companionship and connection to people with a disability or hearing loss. Amazingly, these service dogs are trained to pick up dropped items, turn on and off light switches, tug doors open, alert people who have hearing loss to sounds such as a door knock, alarm clock or smoke alarm, fetch a cordless phone in an emergency, offer valuable assistance to social challenges faced by autism, be a Trauma Assistance Dog for Veterans with Post-traumatic stress, and meet a multitude of needs. We all would have taken Boris home, but he is much too adorable to discipline. The program was heart-warming and moving, and some tears of compassion were shed. God Bless our Canine connections!

Another interesting Guild program is scheduled for December 12th at 1 PM in Allerton Hall. Reverend Rosemary Peters, a retired Baptist minister, leads Bible study groups in Carver with a focus on women in The Bible. Reverend Peters will take on the persona of Mary and Martha and reenact their story from a woman's perspective in the present. Susan Miller, who attends Reverend Peter's Bible study, will be our Hostess. All are welcome to attend our December meeting and Christmas gathering.

Also, at our December meeting, we will continue with our Mission Goal of Teen Gifts for The Salvation Army. If any anyone would like to help us with this mission, please bring new clothes or toys for teenagers to the John Robinson Center. Guild members will bring their contributions to our December 12th meeting.

Hi-Tech Pilgrims?

Do you know anyone who is shut in and lonely, wishing for a way to re-connect with their friends and family who are perhaps far removed from them, a way that virtually brings them together in real time without the need for travel? Modern technology, with the assistance of computer literate members of our church, young and old, may be an answer to their prayers! The Board of Deacons is exploring the idea of using the well-known Skype® video communication program to do just that, enabling such folks to talk face-to-face with anyone else in the world, and at no cost. The idea, which came out of COTP's Wednesday Morning Bible Study group, is actually not brand new; it is being done with great success in other places around the country, in family homes as well as nursing homes, senior centers, hospitals and any place with internet and/or cellular phone service! The Deacons are just beginning to research this idea to better understand who it could serve in our own membership and the details of how it would work. Initially we see this as a possible youth group or confirmation class ministry, but it could easily include adults who are so inclined. COTP's Visitation Ministry might find it to be a very effective and fun tool as well. Surprisingly, the technology is the easy part! (All it takes is internet access and a computer with a small, inexpensive video camera. Where internet access is not available, a wireless "hot spot" device can be used to access the internet via cell phone signals. If someone doesn't have their own computer, which will often be the case, all this can be done with a properly equipped laptop computer which our visitors could carry with them.) We may find logistical issues such as setting up our visits and scheduling the Skype calls to be the bigger challenges.

So many of our elders and shut-ins find themselves feeling quite alone. Yet, our busy lives make it hard to find time for them. And simply opening a conversation with them can sometimes be hard for us, especially if we don't know them. Facilitating a Skype conversation for them might not only be the perfect ice-breaker but also a wonderful way to get to know them and allow them to share their story.

Please speak to Pastor Helen, Sam Butterfield, or any one of the Deacons if you would like to work with us on this project. We're pretty excited about this and hope some of you will be too.

Feasibility Study

The feasibility study to determine our ability to raise the funds to make the necessary repairs to our aging sanctuary is progressing on schedule. Fifteen members were interviewed by our consultant, Reverend P. William (Bill) VanderWyden of VanderWyden Consultants, on November 20, 21, 24 and 25. Reverend Bill will prepare a written report detailing his findings, which will be presented to the entire congregation at the church meeting on Sunday, January 25th, 2015. In the meantime, Trustee Tom Mudgett (along with Trustee Roy Mathis) who has been instrumental in working with the contractor, will continue to provide brief walking tours of the church after worship to give folks an "up close and personal" view of the extensive and long overdue work that is required. Poster boards with several pictures of our bell tower and other damaged areas are available in Allerton Hall during coffee hour. I'd like to especially thank Rosa Cook for her persistent, diligent hard work in scheduling all of the interviews and also Diana Budge for her willingness to provide lots of refreshments while the interviewees awaited their session with the consultant. I will keep you in the loop as we progress towards this monumental decision in 2015. Have a very Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year! Don Reinhardt, Feasibility Study Chair.

Monday Meals of Hospitality

First of all, we are delighted to report that, for the second year, Monday Meals has received a donation from the Lions Club of Plymouth. The club increased their gift this year to \$2000 in recognition of the importance of feeding those in need. We especially thank Diana Budge, who brought our program to their attention. Diana attended the Club's Charity Awards Dinner to receive the gift ---- which, as it happened, was presented by her nephew, the Master of Ceremonies. If you should meet anyone in the Lions' Club, please do mention how happy we all are to receive this wonderful gift.

In other news, there has been a noticeable increase in attendance at Monday Meals this season. We were anticipating 30 to 40 people when we opened in early September, but 55 people came in for a meal that day. Over the past ten weeks, participation has averaged in the mid-fifties and reached 67 on one occasion. In order to try to control costs, and to make sure that we have an adequate amount of food to cover all who come, the MM Steering Committee has decided to limit the servings of hot meals to only one per person. Take-outs are still provided to those who have to leave for one reason or another, or those taking food to the homeless who can't manage to come in. Unfortunately second helpings are no longer encouraged --- a difficult decision, but we'll see how it works. To compensate somewhat, we have nearly doubled the number of take-out bagged sandwiches and now routinely prepare 46 each week – up from 24 originally.

Planning is underway to again hold a dinner on Christmas Day. Last year most of the Homeless as well as many of our regular MM participants joined in. Although T-Bones Restaurant usually generously provides most of the dinner, extra desserts are always welcome.

Again, we thank all of the volunteers and members for their time, ideas and generous donations, all of which make the program possible.


